AAIM's IDENTITY STATEMENT

The Adventist AIDS International Ministry (AAIM) is an international ministry of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, that brings hope, love, compassionate care and support to the people touched by the HIV epidemic. It serves the territory of the sub-Saharan Africa and the Indian-Ocean.

AAIM's MISSION STATEMENT

To coordinate actions and resources, to bring comfort, healing and hope to people infected and/or affected by HIV/AIDS, share a message of education and prevention to the general population, and present a united front in order to accomplish what our Lord Jesus Christ has commissioned each of us to do in Matthew 25:35-36 and 28:19-20.

AAIM's VISION STATEMENT

We are creating "Centers of Hope and Healing" through our network of churches, medical and educational institutions, and church members. We are mobilizing our congregations through church based support groups. We are bringing practical solutions to those infected and affected by HIV and AIDS. We are applying the practical Gospel of Jesus Christ, field by field, church by church, person by person, on a one-to-one basis. We are committed to the social responsibility of our church. We are helping create a new generation of parents and children, free of AIDS!

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1 – INTRODUCTION

Only six months have passed since the last time we met for the last AAIM Board Meeting. So many things and so much news has happened, that it seems almost overwhelming.

The year 2012 has been an exceptional year for AAIM. Several events confirmed the value and extent of its mission.

From Coordinators to Support Groups, and from Support Groups to Associations and Regional Networks, our churches are actively sharing AAIM's vision and mission through this Ministry of Hope, Love and Compassion.

Our churches are becoming Centers of Hope and Healing in many parts of Africa.

New programs for children, young adults and couples to be married are currently being implemented.

2 – LATEST NEWS ON HIV/AIDS

2.1 From WHO and UNAIDS


The following statements and graphs from the most renowned world health and AIDS organizations, come at a time of extraordinary hope, a time when more and more people are believing that the end of the AIDS epidemic is possible:

“The global community has made great progress in responding to the AIDS epidemic. More people than ever are receiving treatment, care and support. The prevention revolution is delivering dramatic results while science is offering new hope.” - Ban Ki-moon, Secretary-General of the United Nations.

2.2 From the International AIDS Society Conference

This meeting took place in Washington D.C. between July 22-27, and was a really important one for everyone working on the fight against HIV/AIDS, and specially this year when scientists and activists feel we are at a critical point where we can truly call for an “end to AIDS by 2015”, which means getting the Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission (PMTCT) down to zero new cases. Right now, this is the call to action.

in low- and middle-income countries in 2011



Turning the Tide Together: A Declaration to End the AIDS Epidemic

One of the great accomplishments of these meetings was “The Washington D.C. Declaration - Turning the tide together,” which recognizes the fact that we stand at a unique time in the history of the AIDS epidemic. Through new scientific advances and societal, political and human rights gains, it is possible to turn the tide against AIDS and begin to end the epidemic in our lifetimes.

People receiving antiretroviral therapy versus the 2015 target and the number of AIDS-related deaths, low- and middle-income countries, 2003–2011



The information recently published by the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Joint United Nations Program on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS), shows significant changes in the statistics which indicate great progress in the fight against HIV/AIDS. The most important ones are:

- 1) The decrease in the number of people newly infected,
- 2) The decrease in the number of children newly infected
- 3) The decrease in the number of deaths

Global HIV and AIDS estimates (Latest statistics from 2010)

People living with HIV/AIDS in 2010	34 million
Proportion of women living with HIV/AIDS	50%
Children living with HIV/AIDS in 2010	3.4 million
People newly infected with HIV in 2010	2.7 million
Children newly infected with HIV in 2010	390,000*
AIDS deaths in 2010	1.8 million

**This is a drop of 24% from 5 years earlier (UNAIDS Report 2010)*

Extraordinary scientific advances are providing the tools to control and ultimately end the AIDS epidemic. However, HIV testing continues to be the critical gateway to therapy. Home based testing is being encouraged, in order to obtain earlier diagnosis and treatment².

² Home Based HIV Testing is not yet available in Africa. South Africa may be the first country to approve it at approximately 10 Rands per test. A Massachusetts biotechnology company is involved in the negotiations.

3.3 AAIM On-going Programs in Africa:

1. Centers of Hope & Healing - Each Church a Health Center for the Community - Church Based Support Groups

2. Giving Hope to the Hopeless - Home Based Care, Income Generating Activities, Sewing Workshops & other Skills Development Activities, Food Gardens.

3. Caring for the Vulnerable Children - Orphans Care, Feeding Programs, Clothing and Shoes Distribution.

4. Caring for the Youth - Special Programs for the Youth, Resilience Development & Prevention of Risky Behaviours

5. Caring for the Care-Givers - HIV/AIDS Education and Support for the Grandmothers & Grandfathers' Clubs

Our churches play a very important role through the **active presence of its support groups in the communities** and their interaction with the infected and the affected.

3.4 French Translation of AAIM Training Manual - Lay-out in process

An updated translation of the AAIM Training Manual was finished in May this year under the direction of Mrs. Caroline Coralie, from the ECD Translation Department.

Based on the 2007 first edition, AAIM has updated all the statistical and scientific information.

This newest French Training Manual is currently being modified to follow the modern layout of its English version.

This publication is scheduled for March 2013, and will be electronically distributed through the HIV/AIDS Coordinators of the French speaking countries of ECD, SID and WAD.

The Manual has eight sections; the first four dedicated to the description of the infection, the following four dedicated to the spiritual and social aspects of the epidemic, as well as to the action plan.

The last section number eight, is self explanatory and serves to implement the whole program. It contains all the steps necessary to organize a training seminar, and the check-lists to implement each of the steps of Planning, Preparation and Production of the event.

4. MAIN EVENTS 2012

4.1 SID-HIV/AIDS Advisory Feb. 26- March 1 2012

It was a very important event that gathered all the SID HIV/AIDS Coordinators for a Division wide Advisory on the epidemic for the first time.

The main characteristics of this event:

- The first one of this kind in SID
- Joint effort SID-AAIM
- Participation of 8 out of 10 Country Coordinators
- Participation of 2 Conference Presidents (Lesotho and Swaziland)
- Participation of 2 invitees from Kenya and one from Lesotho
- Participation of SID Key Departmental Directors
- Great opportunity for interaction and mutual enrichment. (18 participants)
- **Consolidation of the SID/AAIM network of HIV/AIDS Coordinators in the region with the highest HIV Prevalence in the World.**

4.2 Zimbabwe AAIM/ZAAM-HIV/AIDS Convention

This event was the first of its kind in the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Africa. It took place on May 10-14, in Bulawayo, Zimbabwe.

It represents the highest level achieved by ZAAM - Zimbabwe Adventist AIDS Ministries, which is a branch of the Adventist AIDS International Ministry.

His Excellency the Deputy Minister of Health and Child Welfare, Dr. E. Mombeshora, honored the event with his presence, and expressed his deep appreciation for the excellent work done by ZAAM.

Also present at this event was the SID President, Dr. Paul Ratsara, as well as the representatives of the Health Team of the General Conference, the GC AAIM team, the SID Health Ministries Team, Health Ministries Directors of other SID Unions and Union Conference Officers and Departmental Directors.

A highlight of this convention was the presence and participation of several Adventists living with HIV, who participated in a special ceremony where they received a gift, consisting of a blanket, that was wrapped around each person living positively, signifying the church's warmth, acceptance and support.

Several people were recognized as pioneers in the HIV/AIDS work in Zimbabwe, among those were Pastor Denias Chiwhai, who worked until 2005, before traveling to England and Brother Dumisani Nkomo - the first Adventist to openly declare his HIV positive status in Zimbabwe; Pastor Paminus Machamire and Pastor Salomon Maphosa.⁴

This event marks an important milestone in the history of AAIM, because for the first time all major activities and outreach of this Ministry were combined into one program.

4.3 Kenya Association of Adventists Living with HIV/AIDS

The East Central Africa Division HIV/AIDS Coordinator, Dr. Fesaha Tsegaye, reported the re-organization of the Association of Adventists Living with HIV/AIDS in Kenya. Mr. Daniel Tirop, East Africa Union HIV/AIDS Coordinator, worked with the group of Adventists to have their Association on track again.

First organized several years ago by Pastor John Machiaria, it was discontinued because of stigmatization and lack of support. It was reactivated by AAIM in 2006-7 with the presence of 46 members under the leadership of Sheila Ongwino, Henry Ombasa and Alice Alolo.

The current effort is the third attempt to keep this Association functioning.

This variability is an expression of the challenges Adventists Living with HIV/AIDS have to face. We pray and hope that more support will be given to these Associations, which are a powerful means to dispel the stigma still present in our churches.

4.4 Ethiopia AAIM Sewing Program Graduating Ceremony and Baptism

In November 2004, AAIM started a sewing workshop in Ethiopia, to help People Living with HIV/AIDS.

Under the direction of Sister Genet, herself an HIV positive person, this project has continued without interruption helping dozens of people, women and men, and providing skills for an income generating activity.

Five people graduated and received diplomas on 7 July 2012.

AAIM is very glad to announce another baptism, fruit of the work of this project.

Based in KOTOBÉ Church, and equipped and sponsored by AAIM, it operates from Addis-Ababa, under the supervision of AAIM HIV/AIDS Coordinator for Ethiopia, Ms. Gelane Kumera.

We praise the name of the Lord for His many blessings on this project.

4.5 Democratic Republic of Congo - AAIM Activities in Kinshasa

With the appointment of Dr. Jean Badinanyi as HIV/AIDS Coordinator for the West and South Congo Conferences, AAIM activities in that region have taken a new direction.

Dr. Badinanyi organized a series of Programs in the coastal region of Matadi and a Youth Camp Meeting.

Included in Dr. Badinanyi's plan for the future are the Associations of West Congo, South Congo, Equateur, Kasai Central, East Kasai, and West Kasai.

More programs were presented in the churches of Ozone, Djelo Binza, Delvaux and Bandalungua.

More than 600 participants attended these programs. Fighting Stigmatization, Rejection and Isolation were among the main themes of the seminars, together with a strong encouragement for HIV testing and counseling.

4.6 Lesotho Grandmothers' Training Center - Opening of 1st Phase

Grandmothers' Clubs were started in Lesotho in 2004 by AAIM - Adventist AIDS International Ministry, for the purpose of lending support to grandmothers who suddenly found themselves having to care for a number of grandchildren at an age when they were no longer earning an income.

Part of this support was to teach income generating activities, management of their meager finances, nutrition, psycho-social support for the orphans and food-gardens, etc.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church in Lesotho was honored by the presence of several government dignitaries on the occasion of the official opening of a Training Center where the Grandmothers can pass on necessary skills, principles and values to their orphaned grandchildren.

The center is located on the grounds of Emmanuel Mission School, in the Kingdom of Lesotho, Africa. The grandmothers cleared the land themselves. Construction began in 2010, and the first building was finished during the month of July this year.

On Sunday the 12th of August 2012, the dream of a community center for the grandmothers, finally became a reality with the ribbon cutting ceremony conducted by the Honorable Prime Minister of Lesotho, Mr. Thomas Motsoahae Thabane, accompanied by four ministers of his cabinet, as well as the Speaker of the Parliament.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church in Lesotho was represented by its president, Pastor Chobokoane, and also Mrs. Kunene, from the Southern Africa Union, who preached on Sabbath.⁵

4.7 South African Association of Adventists Living with HIV/AIDS

A new Association of Adventists Living with HIV/AIDS is in the making.

This time it is the Southern Africa Union (SAU) and the Trans-Orange Conference (TOC) who are taking the initiative under the auspices of AAIM and the Southern Africa Indian Ocean Division.

Dr. Jun Negre, SAU-HMD and Mrs Euginia Keebine, TOC-HIV/AIDS Coordinator are leading the organization of this event, that will be a first for the Adventist Church in the Southern part of the continent.

It seems that all these years of work are bearing fruit, and the time has come for the Adventists to strongly oppose the stigma and discrimination still existing in our churches.

The fact that our brothers and sisters can come out into the open and testify of their condition is a huge step forward in the church's battle against the epidemic.

Lets prepare ourselves to offer as much support as possible, and receive this initiative with hope, love and compassion.

6th AAIM Tri-Divisional Advisory - Planning is underway for the AAIM 2013 Tri-Divisional Advisory in Nairobi between 9-14 September 2013. The implementation of this program depends upon the availability of funds.
